PROPERS OF THE MASS

Introit. Psalm 18:5-7. Circumdederunt. The sorrows of death compassed me, the pains of hell came about me: and in my tribulation I called upon the Lord, and he heard my voice out of his holy temple. Ps. 18:1-2. I will love thee, O lord, my strength: the Lord is my stony rock, my fortress, and my saviour. V. Glory be to the Father...

Collect. O Lord, we beseech thee favourably to hear the prayers of thy people: that we, who are justly punished for our offences, may be mercifully delivered by thy goodness, for the glory of thy name. Through...

Epistle: The Lesson from the Epistle of Blessed Paul the Apostle to the Corinthians. Brethren: Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? So run, that ye may obtain. And every man that striveth for the mastery is temperate in all things. Now they do it to obtain a corruptible crown; but we an incorruptible. I therefore so run, not as uncertainly; so fight I, not as one that beateth the air: But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway. Moreover, brethren, I would not that ye should be ignorant, how that all our fathers were under the cloud, and all passed through the sea; And were all baptized unto Moses in the cloud and in the sea; And did all eat the same spiritual meat; And did all drink the same spiritual drink: for they drank of that spiritual Rock that followed them: and that Rock was Christ. But with many of them God was not well pleased: for they were overthrown in the wilderness. (9:24-27; 10:1-5)

And when he had agreed with the labourers for a penny a day, he sent them into his vineyard. And he went out about the third hour, and saw others standing idle in the marketplace, And said unto them; Go ye also into the vineyard, and whatsoever is right I will give you. And they went their way. Again he went out about the sixth and ninth hour, and did likewise. And about the eleventh hour he went out, and found others standing idle, and saith unto them, Why stand ye here all the day idle? They say unto him, Because no man hath hired us. He saith unto them, Go ye also into the vineyard; and whatsoever is right, that shall ye receive. So when even was come, the lord of the vineyard saith unto his steward, Call the labourers, and give them their hire, beginning from the last unto the first. And when they came that were hired about the eleventh hour, they received every man a penny. But when the first came, they supposed that they should have received more; and they likewise received every man a penny. And when they had received it, they murmured against the goodman of the house, Saying, These last have wrought but one hour, and thou hast made them equal unto us, which have borne the burden and heat of the day. But he answered one of them, and said, Friend, I do thee no wrong: didst not thou agree with me for a penny? Take that thine is, and go thy way: I will give unto this last, even as unto thee. Is it not lawful for me to do what I will with mine own? Is thine eye evil, because I am good? So the last shall be first, and the first last: for many be called, but few chosen. (20:1-16.)

Let thy good Spirit enter into my heart, there silently to sound, and without clamour of words to speak all truth. For exceeding deep are thy Mysteries, and covered with a sacred veil. Of thy great mercy grant me to assist at the Solemnity of the Mass with a clean heart and a pure mind. Set free my heart from all unclean and unholy, all vain and hurtful thoughts.

Defend me with the loving and faithful guard, the mighty protection of thy blessed Angels, that the enemies of all good may go away ashamed. By the virtue of this great Mystery, and by the hand of thy holy Angel, drive away from me and from all thy servants the hard spirit of pride and vain-glory, of impurity and uncleanness, of doubting and mistrust. Let them be confounded that persecute us: let them perish that make haste to destroy us.

SAINT VALENTINE

This week, on the 14th, the Church commemorates three martyrs of the third century, all named Valentine, who suffered as valiant soldiers for the truth of Christ.

THE St. Valentine of whom we know the most was a priest of Rome. In 280 A.D., this St. Valentine was arrested by Claudius the Goth. Under trial for his Christianity, Valentine gave such a defense of Christ's divinity that he began to sway the



heart of the ruler. But, when the court started to whisper that their emperor's will was weak, Claudius's pride grew up and choked his budding faith. To prove his strength, Claudius condemned St. Valentine, committing the saint to the prefect's custody. Undismayed by Claudius's rejection, St. Valentine told the prefect about his Lord. The prefect's heart, already softened by love for a blind daughter, accepted this truth with hope. At the prefect's plea, St. Valentine prayed for the girl, who received her sight. The faith of the whole house budded, grew, and bore fruit. St. Valentine attained martyrdom shortly after.

IN the Middle Ages, people referred to days by naming the saint then commemorated instead of the month and day. So, when a belief arose that birds selected their mates on the middle day of February, they spoke of this happening on St. Valentine's Day.
